A word from Bobby

An individual came up to me the other day and we had a good conversation about loving God and His people. The person was absolutely sure that building these solar powered OB/GYN medical clinics was a noble action. However, he had concerns, not about how some people's inability to help themselves condemns them to a life of poverty, but regarding our own involvement in God's mandate to love others and the cost of that upon us. There's no way around it: loving God and others will cost us just as it did others in antiquity. Grace is not cheap. It will cost you your time, your talents and your resources.

These theological reflections lead us into a basin theology from Tertullian, "the father of Latin Christianity," who lived in the third century. Tertullian's basin theology will help us understand our competing commitments. Twice in the New Testament water basin was used to explain these differing perspectives of service. If we will remember what Pilate did with his basin during his time with Jesus and how Jesus used his basin for his disciples, it will help us to identify our understanding of commitment and service in this world.

Pilate gave us one understanding of Basin Theology. After a small conversation with Jesus, the chief priest and the whole assembly, Pilate took the water from the basin and said, "I am innocent of this man's blood, it is your responsibility!" He washed his hands and left them.

On the other hand, Jesus was identified as the Word of God, the Lamb of God, the Good Shepherd, the Messiah, the Light of the world, the King of kings...yet, He took a towel and a water basin and then knelt down and washed His disciple's feet. In this vulnerable position, He was not only washing His friends' feet, but also the one who would deny Him and betray Him to His death.

Jesus understood the mandate for loving His disciples and He gave us this example to follow.

Just as the gentleman who approached me about our clinic began asking questions about our own involvement in God's service to the world, we, too, in the simplicity of Basin Theology are called to consider our own competing commitments. Will we, like Pilate, wash our hands and move on, selfishly and in our privilege neglect the needs of those around us? Or, will we, like Jesus, empty ourselves before God and the world in the service of His Kingdom?

Let us empty our basins in sanctification, knowing that the time of fulfillment isn't now but in the time to come, when we commune with the God who will say, "well done, my good and faithful friend." Amen.

The Samburu Agape Sewing Center



The sewing center is growing! Thank you for the donation of 16 foot-pedal sewing machines to the Samburu people in northern Kenya. This was such a great blessing!

The Samburu Agape Sewing Center is now serving 35 families to help them make money to support their families. They work in shifts to share the machines so more families can benefit from them. The women who use the sewing machines are busy making masks to sell--they protect not only from Covid, but also from TB and dust pneumonia. It's gotten very dry again and the dust storms can be very powerful and dangerous. Women are also buying them to cover their faces when they cook in the manyatta because it's sometimes very smoky! They are also sewing other items such as simple school uniforms and other clothing. Some of the shops are starting to buy some of their items! We thank you for these sewing machines!
