****From Fort Pulaski to the Washington Monument: A Jerry Can Ride for Clean Water Awareness****

Savannah, Georgia — On September 10, 2024, as I celebrate my 65th birthday and join the Medicare group, I will embark on a journey that has been a dream of mine for the past five or six years—The Jerry Can Walk or Ride for the glory of God and to raise awareness about the critical need for clean water for both marginalized and non marginalized communities around the world.

Clean water is not just a necessity; it is a life-changing resource. Unfortunately, too many people around the world still suffer from a lack of access to this basic human right. During a visit to Northern Kenya, Dr. Michael Lolwerikoi shared with me a heartbreaking story that underscores the urgency of this issue. A young, nine-months pregnant woman walked a mile to fetch contaminated water from a creek for her family. Tragically, while fetching the water, her own water broke, and she gave birth right there with only a friend to assist her. Lacking any medical supplies, they managed to return to her home, but something went wrong and she died that night from unknown complications.

In the Congo, Reverend Dr. Kimba Evasite tells me of another tragic event from the village of Kasenga in the Katanga region. A mother, while gathering water for her family, lost her small child to a crocodile that attacked the child. The incident sent waves of terror through the entire village.

These stories, along with countless other experiences from my life and ministry, have propelled me to take action. On September 10th, I will set out on the Jerry Can Ride, beginning on Cockspur Island at Fort Pulaski, where John Wesley and General Oglethorpe once knelt in prayer for this great state and country. I will be taking a jerry can brought from Africa and, by God's grace, my journey will take me all the way to the Washington Monument in Washington, D.C, a distance of approximately 684 miles, which I plan to complete in about 20 days by bicycle.

This Ride is not just a personal dream come true but it is a biblical understanding of Matthew 25:31-40, and a mission to bring attention to the life-altering importance of fresh clean water. I invite others to join me in spirit, in prayer, in work and support to change these critical water issues for those affected by unclean water.



WHAT IS A JERRY CAN?

The Jerry Can plays a crucial role in impoverished areas by providing a reliable means to transport and store essential resources, particularly water and fuel. In regions where access to clean or contaminated water is limited, the durable design of the Jerry Can allows individuals to efficiently collect and carry water from distant sources, significantly improving their ability to meet basic needs. Additionally, it serves as a vital tool for storing fuel, enabling families to cook and keep warm, thereby enhancing their overall quality of life. By facilitating better access to these vital resources, the Jerry Can contributes to improved health, economic stability, and a greater sense of security in communities facing resource scarcity.



More jerry cans at work. Sometimes I think that I'm having a bad day, then I remember others who have been carrying these jerry cans all day. Fresh clean water is a blessing and running water in the house is even a greater blessing. Counting my blessings!
